Rebuilding the Jones Long Barn has taken far more time than any of us realized. The campaign to *Rebuild the Barn*, however, will soon be in full swing!

Our highly dedicated and enthusiastic core of volunteers - some whom may be your neighbors - are getting prepared to undertake the task at hand: raising approximately \$350,000 to rebuild the barn. Watch for our Capital Campaign to get underway shortly. Of course, the Trust hasn't been waiting around! The first half of 2008 has been

LOCAL HISTORY NOTES.... FROM HERB FRY

TREDYFFRIN'S AMATEUR ASTRONOMER

Harry Barlow Rumrill was born in Philadelphia in 1867 but raised and educated in Haddonfield, New Jersey. By vocation he was an accountant for the Pennsylvania Railroad where he spent his entire 49-yr career. By avocation he was an amateur astronomer. He was approaching middle age when he moved to Tredyffrin from Bryn Mawr in 1911 with his wife and 2 children to make his home in an old stone house on Conestoga Road. The house, had as early as 1847 served briefly as a meeting place when Paoli Lodge, No. 290, Independent Order of Odd Fellows, was instituted there.

In early years, Rumrill was a dedicated music student, and he acquired excellent skills as an organist and musician. He was first exposed to astronomy in high school. However, the science was just a casual curiosity until 1904 when he bought a book that raised his level of interest, and he began assembling the components of a modest telescope.

Soon, he crossed paths with the Rev. Alden Walker Quimby, pastor of Berwyn Methodist Church, at a lecture on astronomy, where he became noted for his regularly published series of daily observations of the sun, covering 32 years.

Rumrill and Quimby formed a close friendship.

Before Rev. Quimby died in 1922, he asked Rumrill to continue the sun-spot work. An analysis of Quimby's observations shows that he averaged 335 observations a year. To keep the daily schedule going, Rumrill adopted the practice of observing the sun early each morning before work. When he retired in 1932, he planned and constructed in his back yard on Conestoga Road a 16-ft square astronomical observatory in which he mounted his telescope with 4-in. lens. He continued his observations up to the day of his death in 1951.

Harry Rumrill did an extensive amount of writing to popularize astronomy. From 1932, the year he retired, until 1940 he contributed 21 articles to the Mutual Magazine published by the Pennsylvania RR. From 1947-1949 he wrote 33 articles for Upper Main Line News. He also submitted material to Popular Astronomy magazine, one such article summarizing the results of his own and Rev. Quimby's observations. In it he attempted some analysis of the whole time series. A tribute to Rumrill appeared in Popular Astronomy shortly after his death.

In this age of space exploration, our community can be justly proud of Mr. Rumrill's legacy left for those

British Colonial Tea Biscuits

- 1 cup butter
- 1 cup milk
- 4 eggs
- 3 cups flour
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 ½ tsp. baking soda

FROM THE - TREASURER

In May 2008 the Trust was one of two recipients of major grants awarded by the Chester County Conference & Visitors Bureau. The \$30,000 grant is to be used for capital projects. In our case, we will use it to fund the architectural and engineering services required to prepare design and construction documents for the Jones Log Barn rebuilding. The grant is a 'matching grant' meaning the Trust must match dollar for dollar the monies we receive from Chester County Conference & Visitors Bureau.

This is the second grant the Trust has received from the Chester County Conference & Visitors Bureau. In 2005 we also received a matching grant that enabled us to retain the architectural firm Frens & Frens to provide Phase 1 services including historical research and preliminary schematic design.

The Trust is grateful to the Chester County Conference & Visitors Bureau for their continued support of the Trust and its mission to rebuild the Jones Log Barn. It demonstrates the significance of the Barn and the Bureau's confidence in our plan to develop a Regional Education History Center.

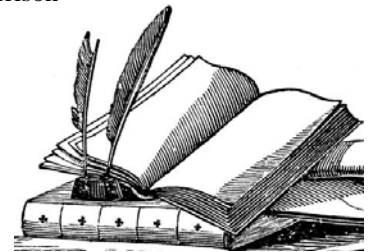

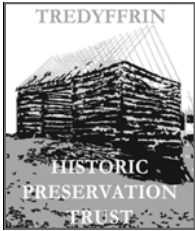
